## Review of the Big Muse Winter Concert, 25th June 2017 by Jo Cherry

Not even a bitterly cold Winters day could stop the Friends and supporters of The Muse from enjoying a spirited and passionate performance at Beulah Church on Sunday 25th June. The West African Drumming class began the concert with a high intensity performance led by Maganui Stewart and Robert Fugah. The joyous rhythms and vocals had the audience joining in. Robert's infectious happiness and Maganui's passion were wonderful to see.

Open Song Choir took the stage beginning with an evocative piece, Kuaka/Godwits, that painted a picture of these amazing birds. They then sang Calango in Portuguese, and Amavolovo which is a South African arrangement. The choir performed with passion and their last piece, Prince's "When Doves Cry", sung with A Capellago, was haunting.

A Capellago World Music Choir gave an assured and very engaging performance of songs from Israel, Spain, Haiti, and Cuba with the small ensemble singing beautifully with very impressive solo performances by some members.

The Rockers of Ages demonstrated their wide repertoire with their first work "Lovesong" by the Cure. The arrangement of this work for choir was well done and delivered with confidence. "Asho Chela" from Georgia and "Kitakami" from Japan were sung with real skill and were totally engaging. "Ode to Leunig" which Nikki Berry wrote with reference to a Leunig poem, was a refreshingly honest and touching piece that ended a well delivered and impressive set by the Rockers.

The massed choir left the audience with the experience of a truly beautiful and heart-warming winter event. Well done to all involved!
